Japan's new response to the Ebola outbreak

On November 7, the Government of Japan committed <u>US\$ 12.06 million</u> in medical and disease-prevention equipment to <u>Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone</u> (US\$ 4.02 million to each government), and a financial contribution of <u>US\$ 5.94 million</u> to the <u>UN Ebola Response Multi-Partner Trust Fund</u> in support of the UN Mission for Ebola Emergency Response (UNMEER). These new contributions, totaling US\$ 18 million, <u>complete Japan's allocation of US\$ 40 million</u>, announced by Prime Minister Shinzo Abe on September 25 at the UN High-level Meeting on Response to Ebola Virus Disease Outbreak in New York.

Also on November 7, Japan announced new assistance of up to <u>US\$ 100 million</u> to boost Ebola outbreak response by supporting the healthcare systems and stabilizing societies in affected countries. This new assistance is in addition to measures already in place to treat infected patients and stop the current outbreak.
