1. The Second Japan-Australia-India-U.S. Summit Meeting

On September 24, Prime Minister SUGA Yoshihide of Japan attended the Japan-Australia-India-U.S. Summit Meeting with the Hon Scott Morrison, MP, Prime Minister of the Commonwealth of Australia; H.E. Mr. Narendra Modi, Prime Minister of India; and The Honorable Joseph R. Biden, Jr., President of the United States of America. Topics included the "Free and Open Indo-Pacific," COVID-19, technology/climate change, and current issues in and around the region. Their joint statement can be found <u>here.</u>

2. Address by Prime Minister Suga at the United Nations General Assembly

On September 24, at the General Debate, PM Suga expressed his condolences to those who lost loved ones due to COVID-19 and spoke of the unity that the Tokyo Olympics symoblized to the world. He hopes to overcome this pandemic and notes the initiatives taken towards doing so. In guiding the world towards a better future, PM Suga spoke on four points: resilient global health systems, a green and sustainable society, a free and open international order, and a more peaceful and secure international community. PM Suga closed his address by speaking of the importance of international collaboration and multilaterism.

3. <u>Prime Minister SUGA Yoshihide's attendance to the UN Food Systems</u> <u>Summit</u>

On September 24, PM Suga delivered a video message at the UN Food Systems Summit, which was held virtually from September 23 to 25 (JST). This summit was held for the first time this year. PM Suga welcomed the Summit as a timely event in the midst of increasing food insecurity due to multiple factors, including the spread of COVID-19. He stated that Japan will work towards establishing better global "food systems," focusing on driving innovation, digitalization and the utilization of science and technology, maintaining and strengthening free and fair trade, and considering each country and region's climate, nature, and food culture. Japan is determined to host the "Tokyo Nutrition for Growth Summit" in December, lead international efforts to eradicate poverty and hunger, and improve nutrition for people around the world.

4. Japan-U.S. Foreign Ministers' Meeting

On September 22, Mr. MOTEGI Toshimitsu, Minister for Foreign Affairs of Japan, met with the Honorable Antony Blinken, Secretary of State of the United States. They shared the view to continue to strengthen the Japan-U.S. Alliance and will further cooperation among allies and like-minded countries through various frameworks. The two ministers also exchanged their views on Afghanistan, China, and North Korea, and discussed the

international order in the Indo-Pacific region, including the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP). Mr. Motegi encouraged the U.S. to return to the TPP.

5. Updates on the COVID-19 Situation in Japan

Beginning October 1, 2021 at 0:00 a.m. (JST), travelers and returnees to Japan from the State of Washington, Montana, and Idaho are still subject to the 14-day self-quarantine, but those who have a valid Vaccination Certificate, voluntarily take a COVID test (PCR or Quantitative Antigen Test) after 10 days of self-quarantining after entry into Japan, and submit the negative test result to the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare of Japan are not required to self-quarantine for the remainder of the 14 days.

Founded in 1987, The JET Program has sent more than 70,000 participants from around the globe and is the only teaching exchange program managed by the Government of Japan.
