1. Prime Minister Ishiba meets with President Trump

Visit to the United States

On February 6, 2025, Prime Minister Ishiba visited Washington, D.C., United States.

The following day, on February 7, Prime Minister Ishiba <u>held a summit meeting with</u> <u>the Honorable Donald J. Trump, President of the United States of America</u>, followed by a Japan-U.S. leaders' working lunch. This was followed by <u>a joint press</u> <u>conference</u>, a <u>visit to Arlington National Cemetery</u>, and a courtesy call from the Honorable Scott Bessent, Secretary of the Treasury of the United States of America. The events of the summit meeting are summarized below.

At the beginning of the event, Prime Minister Ishiba emphasized the importance of the U.S. for Japan's diplomacy and security and expressed a desire to strengthen the Japan-U.S. Alliance under President Trump's leadership, aiming for a free and open Indo-Pacific. Both leaders agreed on addressing security challenges and elevating their alliance. They pledged to enhance deterrence capabilities and reaffirmed the U.S.'s commitment to Japan's defense, including the Senkaku Islands. They also agreed on advancing economic ties, with Japan aiming to invest one trillion dollars in the U.S. in the near future, developing and enhancing cooperation in technology and energy security.

Regarding regional issues, they aligned on concerns over China's aggressive actions and the situation in North Korea, committing to cooperation on denuclearization and resolving abduction issues. They agreed to strengthen coordination with other likeminded countries and affirmed their close partnership to further develop Japan-U.S. relations. At the end of the meeting. Prime Minister Ishiba invited President Trump to visit Japan soon.

2. United Nations Courtesy Call

On January 31, commencing at 6:00 p.m. for approximately 15 minutes, Prime Minister ISHIBA Shigeru, received a courtesy call by H.E. Mr. Philemon YANG, President of the 79th session of the United Nations General Assembly, who was visiting Japan upon the invitation of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan. The overview of the meeting is as follows:

At the outset, Prime Minister ISHIBA welcomed President YANG's visit to Japan, and stated that it was important for the UN General Assembly to play a greater role in the severe international environment as represented by the situation in Ukraine. In response, the President of the UN General Assembly Mr. YANG expressed his appreciation for the invitation by the Government of Japan and for Japan's contribution to the United Nations.

Mr. YANG stated the importance of implementing the outcome document of the Summit of the Future. In response, Prime Minister ISHIBA commended President

YANG's leadership in adopting the outcome document of the Summit of the Future. Mr. YANG also stated that many countries acknowledge the need for the UN Security Council reform. Both sides also exchanged views on sustainable development in Africa, including TICAD 9 to be held in Yokohama in August this year.

Today, the 5th H3 Launch Vehicle was successfully launched from the Tanegashima Space Center, deploying MICHIBIKI No. 6, Quasi-Zenith Satellite System (QZS-6), into its target orbit.

The Government is committed to making full use of the Quasi-Zenith Satellite System, including MICHIBIKI No. 6, and taking all necessary steps to ensure easy access to positioning information services for even more users.
