1. Anniversary of the Fukushima Earthquake Disaster

Visit to Fukushima Prefecture

On March 11, 2025, Prime Minister Ishiba visited Fukushima Prefecture.

The Prime Minister visited the R&D facility of a robotics manufacturing company in Fukushima City, followed by a small group talk with business leaders engaged in driving innovation creation.

Afterwards, the Prime Minister attended the Memorial Ceremony Marking the 14th Anniversary of the Great East Japan Earthquake and delivered a memorial address and spoke to the press regarding his visit to Fukushima Prefecture and other matters.

In his commemorative address, Prime Minister Ishiba reflected on the 14 years since the devastating earthquake, tsunamis, and the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant accident. He expressed deep sympathy for those who lost loved ones and those still living as evacuees, particularly in Fukushima. Ishiba acknowledged the steady progress in reconstruction, including the lifting of evacuation orders and improvements in living conditions, though he emphasized that long-term support is needed for full recovery.

He highlighted the ongoing decommissioning of the Fukushima Daiichi plant, efforts to revitalize the region's industries, and initiatives like the Fukushima Innovation

Coast Framework. Ishiba stressed the importance of the upcoming "Second Reconstruction and Revitalization Period" in addressing further challenges. He underscored the lessons learned from the disaster, which will guide future disaster preparedness and response. He concluded with prayers for the departed, wishing for peace and tranquility for those who were affected.

2. International Women's Day

<u>Video Message from Prime Minister ISHIBA Shigeru on</u> International Women's Day

The following is a summary of the remarks Prime Minister Ishiba gave on March 8 for the occasion of International Women's Day.

Prime Minister Ishiba began by expressing respect and gratitude to those working for women's empowerment and gender equality globally. He emphasized that women's empowerment is crucial for a society where all individuals feel valued and for the sustainable development of Japan's economy and society.

Prime Minister Ishiba outlined his administration's "Regional Revitalization 2.0" initiative, which focuses on creating regional areas attractive to young people and women, encouraging new opportunities and dreams. He committed to eliminating unconscious bias, addressing wage disparities between men and women, and promoting workplace policies like short-time regular employment to improve work-life balance. Additionally, he pledged to combat the "L-shaped curve" in female employment after childbirth and encourage men to take childcare leave. He concluded by reaffirming his dedication to ensuring that all women can freely pursue their chosen paths.

3. Promoting Tourism in Japan

Ministerial Council on the Promotion of Japan as a Tourism-Oriented Country

On March 18, 2025, Prime Minister Ishiba held the 26th meeting of the Ministerial Council on the Promotion of Japan as a Tourism-Oriented Country at the Prime Minister's Office.

At the meeting, the participants engaged in discussions on the current situation surrounding tourism and implementation status of the current basic plan.

After the discussion, the Prime Minister discussed Japan's tourism growth, highlighting that in 2024, there were about 37 million foreign visitors who spent around 8.1 trillion yen. He emphasized the importance of spreading the benefits of tourism across Japan, particularly in regional areas, as part of "Regional Revitalization 2.0," which helps empower young people and women.

He outlined three key points for advancing tourism:

Promotion of Regional Attractions: Efforts should focus on boosting the appeal of regional tourism, improving transportation networks, and introducing a Japanese version of ESTA to facilitate travel. The Osaka Kansai Expo is seen as an opportunity to attract visitors to regional areas.

Promotion of Sustainable Tourism: Regional areas should benefit from increased tourism, with a focus on smart tourism that adds high value, generates profit, and addresses overtourism through the expansion of successful case studies.

Formulation of the 5th Tourism Nation Promotion Basic Plan: A new plan should be created by the end of fiscal year 2025 to reach the goal of 60 million visitors and 15

trillion yen in spending by 2030. This plan will aim to further develop Japan as a tourism-oriented country.

The Prime Minister urged ministers to collaborate and drive the tourism strategy forward with both public and private sector efforts.
