# Visit to the Venue of Expo 2025 Osaka, Kansai, Japan

On April 5, 2025, Prime Minister Ishiba observed the test run of Expo 2025, Osaka, Kansai, Japan, in Osaka City, Osaka Prefecture.

The Prime Minister held a discussion with participants of the "World CatchBall Project" held on the 4th and observed the Czechia Pavilion.

Afterwards, the Prime Minister took the stage at "Mynavi TGC in EXPO 2025" and delivered remarks. He then visited the "Future City" Pavilion and met with Mr. YOSHIMURA Hirofumi, Governor of Osaka. Finally, he spoke to the press regarding his visit to the venue of Expo 2025 Osaka, Kansai, Japan and other matters.



### Opening Ceremony of Expo 2025 Osaka, Kansai, Japan

On April 12, 2025, Prime Minister Ishiba attended the opening ceremony of Expo 2025 Osaka, Kansai, Japan, held in Osaka City, Osaka Prefecture, in the gracious presence of Their Majesties the Emperor and Empress and Their Imperial Highnesses Crown Prince and Crown Princess Akishino.

The Prime Minister delivered an address at the opening ceremony in his capacity as Honorary Chairperson of Expo 2025 Osaka, Kansai, Japan. Following the opening ceremony, he visited the Osaka Healthcare Pavilion, met with the Thematic Project Producers of the Expo, and then held a meeting with Mr. Dimitri Kerkentzes, Secretary General, Bureau International des Expositions (BIE). Finally, in the gracious presence of Their Imperial Highnesses Crown Prince and Crown Princess Akishino, the Prime Minister attended a reception held in Osaka City and delivered remarks.

### 2. Japan's Response to U.S. Tariffs

# Press Conference by Prime Minister ISHIBA Shigeru regarding Tariff Measures of the United States and Other <u>Matters</u>

Following U.S. President Trump's announcement of new tariffs—24% on Japanese goods and 25% on automobiles—citing exaggerated claims about Japan's rice tariffs, Prime Minister Ishiba laid out a comprehensive response addressing both economic and diplomatic dimensions.

The Prime Minister criticized the U.S. tariffs as unilateral, regrettable, and potentially in violation of World Trade Organization (WTO) rules and the Japan-U.S. Trade Agreement. He highlighted Japan's significant investment in the U.S., especially by automobile companies (\$61.6 billion, 2.3 million jobs). He clarified that most imported rice is tariff-free or subject to a lower tariff (341 yen/kg), not 700% as claimed by President Trump. Japan has used various diplomatic channels to urge the U.S. to reconsider the measures and remains open to direct communication between leaders if necessary.

As a short term solution, 1,000 locations will be set up to support affected small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) and businesses, especially in the auto sector. There will also be relaxed loan conditions from the Japan Finance Corporation and expanded insurance support via Nippon Export and Investment Insurance (NEXI).

Prime Minister Ishiba met with Liberal Democratic Party Policy Chief Itsunori Onodera to coordinate a government-party response. Ministers and officials will be dispatched to key regions of Japan while a ministerial meeting will be held to ensure swift, unified action. Prime Minister Ishiba committed to protecting Japan's economy and industries through strong domestic support and persistent diplomatic engagement, while keeping open the option of direct dialogue with President Trump.

### Japan-U.S. Summit Telephone Talk

On April 7th, Mr. ISHIBA Shigeru, Prime Minister of Japan, held a summit telephone talk with the Honorable Donald J. Trump, President of the United States of America. The overview of the talk is as follows.

Prime Minister Ishiba confirmed with President Trump that, building on the outcomes of the Japan-U.S. Summit Meeting in February, the two leaders would further develop

the overall Japan-U.S. relations and cooperate with each other to realize a free and open Indo-Pacific.

On economy, Prime Minister Ishiba stated that Japan has been the world's largest investor in the U.S. for five consecutive years, expressed strong concerns that the tariff measures by the U.S. could weaken investment capacity among Japanese companies, and conveyed his view that the two countries should pursue ways to promote broader cooperation that benefits both Japan and the United States in a mutual manner, including enhancement of investment, rather than imposing tariffs, and urged a reconsideration of the measures. The two leaders confirmed that they will continue to have candid and constructive discussions.

#### **Comprehensive Response Headquarters for U.S. Tariff Measures**

The first meeting of the Comprehensive Response Headquarters for U.S. Tariff Measures was held on April 8, 2025. Prime Minister Ishiba emphasized Japan's deep concern over the unilateral trade restrictions imposed by the U.S., highlighting their serious impact on Japan-U.S. economic relations, the global economy, and the multilateral trading system.

Ishiba called the new tariffs, including reciprocal ones, regrettable and possibly inconsistent with WTO rules and the Japan-U.S. Trade Agreement. He stressed the importance of the automobile, steel, and aluminum industries to Japan's economy and warned of broader industrial impacts.

Prime Minister Ishiba asked the ministers to examine all U.S. tariff measures and analyze their impact on Japan while continuing to urge the U.S. to reconsider. Prime Minister Ishiba confirmed he had a phone call with President Trump, where both sides agreed to maintain constructive discussions. Finally, he asked the ministers to maintain and expand support measures, including financial assistance for domestic industries hit by the tariffs.

Ishiba called for a unified, government-wide response, urging ministers to collaborate closely across agencies to protect Japan's economy and engage in ongoing diplomatic efforts.

### 3. Japan and NATO Relations

# Meeting between Prime Minister Ishiba and NATO Secretary General Rutte

Prime Minister Ishiba met with NATO Secretary General Mark Rutte during his visit to Japan. The meeting lasted 45 minutes, followed by a joint press conference and an 85-minute working dinner. Foreign Minister Iwaya and Defense Minister Nakatani also participated. A joint statement was issued.

Prime Minister Ishiba welcomed Secretary General Rutte's first visit to the Indo-Pacific and emphasized the inseparable link between Euro-Atlantic and Indo-Pacific security. Both leaders agreed on the growing importance of cooperation between NATO and Indo-Pacific partners, particularly Japan. The Secretary General expressed his intent to deepen NATO-Japan ties, especially in defense industry collaboration.

The Prime Minister stated a strong NATO also benefits Japan and praised Secretary General Rutte's leadership. Both parties agreed the Japan-NATO partnership is strategically vital, and committed to enhancing cooperation in the defense industry, cybersecurity, maritime security, strategic communications, and interoperability.

On the topic of global security, they discussed Russia's invasion of Ukraine and its cooperation with North Korea and the importance of diplomacy for lasting peace in Ukraine. Prime Minister Ishiba also emphasized Japan's support for Ukraine and the Secretary General spoke of NATO's appreciation of that support.

On the topic of east Asia, the two parties shared concern over North Korea's missile and cyber activities, including cryptocurrency theft and how it funds weapons programs. Secretary General Rutte voiced support to Japan's call for resolving the North Korean abductions issue. Both sides stressed the need for like-minded nations to coordinate responses to evolving regional security threats, particularly involving Russia and North Korea.

The meeting marked a step forward in Japan-NATO strategic cooperation, with both sides pledging closer coordination on defense, security, and global peace efforts.
